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# Saturday, February 16

# 1. Call meeting to order

Aaron Starr called the meeting to order at 8:00 a.m.

Aaron Starr read Convention Rule 17 from the Bylaws.

**Motion:** Dan Wiener moved to suspend the rules for the purpose of modifying Convention Rule 17 regarding the nomination of National Delegates: Additional nominations shall be made from the floor only if the person nominated is physically present at the convention and was not present during the previous days. Seconded by Jonathan Zwickel. **Failed to get 2/3 vote.** 

# 2. Credentials Committee Report

The credentials report was tabled to latter in the morning.

# 3. Approve Agenda

Aaron Starr asked for a motion to suspend the rules to consider an alternate agenda. **Motion:** Ray Strong moved to suspend the rules to go to alternate agenda. Seconded. **Failed to get 2/3. Agenda approved unchanged.** 

# 4. Officers Reports

# a) Aaron Starr-Chair

Aaron thanked the delegates for coming on a holiday weekend. He said that this last year being chair has been one of the hardest things and one of the most rewarding things that he has done. He said that the Executive Committee had a very hard year. Aaron explained why the format of the convention had been changed this year. He said he wanted to focus more on the candidates. He said that we need to focus more on gaining members and growing the party rather than on the bylaws and platform.

Aaron explained some of the problems that had resulted from the previous convention. He said that the ExCom was forced to expel a member and suspend the membership of another. He said that the events of Sept. 11 effected the LP's fund raising efforts. He said that we had also lost our Executive Director, Juan Ros to a competing not for profit organization.

Aaron reported that membership was down 18%. He said that this was the case nation wide. He said that this happens after a Presidential election. He said that we were higher than a few years ago and that the drop of 18% was not a new trend. Aaron reported on the progress of a committee that was formed at the last convention called the Political Prisoner Support Committee. He said that he had found a person who had been jailed for drug offense to chair the committee named Hal Chiprin . He said that Hal was doing a great job.

Aaron gave an update on Operation Breakthrough. He said that we had 14 new elected Libertarians in the year 2000. He said that Operation Breakthrough 1.0 had netted the LP 86 victories. He explained about a new effort he started this year to reduce the Utility Tax in California cities. He said that for Operation Breakthrough 2.0 he would like to have 500 candidates. He said that he will need \$70,000 to complete. Aaron said that our new Executive Director instituted a new format for the LPC News which saves the party a substantial portion of our budget. He asked that candidates running for partisan offices go to high schools and colleges.

# b) Rodney Austin -Northern Vice Chair

Rodney said that he had been focusing on working on the unorganized regions. He said that he feels that a strong regional party is the most important thing that the LP can do. He reported on the Conference of Regions in Fresno that he hosts every year. He said that this year they had 17 attendees from 12 regions.

Aaron Starr spoke at the conference and explained more about Operation Energy Tax Revolt and Operation Breakthrough. Others spoke on legal challenges to actor Robert Downey Jr.

# c) Mark Selzer -Southern Vice Chair

Mark gave a report on the activities of the various regions in Southern California. He said that he has been working on getting candidates for partisan offices. He reported on his activities with public access TV.

# d) Sandi Webb-Secretary

Sandi reported that the Executive Committee had met 5 times this year. She reported that the Operations Committee had had one e-mail vote and the Executive Committee had had 17 e-mail votes. She said that the details of these votes as well as other documents are available on her web site (www.sandiwebb.com).

Sandi then turned the floor over to Gail Lightfoot, Chair of the Judicial Committee for a report. Gail reported that the Judicial Committee had been asked to rule on a decision of the Executive Committee. On Sunday, Dec. 9 the Judicial Committee met in Pismo Beach to hear an appeal of the Executive Committee suspension of the central committee membership of Cullene Lang. Present were Gail Lightfoot, John Scott Ballard, Mark Dearoff and Bob Weber. Bill White was absent. The decision of the Judicial Committee was that they say no compelling reason to overturn the decision of the Executive Committee.

# e) Lori Adasiewicz - Treasurer

Lori reported that checks were written in Feb. that the ExCom was not aware of. Aaron and her converted the financial system to a different one that will provide a better audit trail in the future. She said that all of the bookkeeping functions were moved in house.

Year 2001 in review: She said that the report given at the last convention by the previous Treasurer, over stated the balance by \$2,100. This put the party this amount in the red. Soon after this was discovered the extra checks that had been written were found, putting the party in a very grave position through out the year. In early March the party was close to \$15,000 in the red. The Chair and Executive Director were able to raise the needed \$15,000 in May and June. Santa Clara and San Diego Regions were able to loan the party \$9,000. With a membership drive and Operation Breakthrough we were able to pay back these regions. She reported that after direct deposit was instituted the Anthrax scare hit Washington DC. All checks from National LP headquarters were held up except the direct deposit. This prevented us from being behind in the UMP region dues. She reported that we were finally able to collect the overpayment to Cullene Lang.

Lori reported that most of the LPC income is from the pledge program. She said that this is the most efficient way the LPC can raise funds. 96% of every pledged dollar goes directly to programs. Fundraising letters don't do as well. 21% of money received from fundraising letters is actually able to go into programs. She said that the money raised at the conventions is 5% of the total income.

Lori said that the administrative portion of the budget is the largest expense. It includes the office, salary, office supplies, rent, phones, travel, meals, etc. She said that we had one and one half paid staff. Overall Lori said we were in good shape for the end of the year especially considering where we started. She said that National has allocated more funds for membership recruitment for next year.

# f) Executive Director - David Molony

David said that his first three weeks were very eventful. With his first Executive Committee meeting, representing the party in a lawsuit and Sept. 11 attack. He said that he spent a lot of time in December getting the LP News switched from the previous editor and the Operation Tax Revolt up and running. There was also redistricting and the complications with the elections that this brought on. He said that he has reorganized the office. He said that he is now working on a new project called Project Cyclone. This project is to bring people into the LPC. He said that in the last three weeks he had brought in 22 volunteers to the office. They make fundraising calls, membership calls and write letters to the editor. They have helped as

walking sheets for the Operation Tax Revolt volunteers, provided new graphics for the LPC News and calls for the convention. They are compiling a list of all the elected offices are in the State of California. David said that he would like to see that all of the Regions have a web site. He said that most of the local regions now have a site off of the state site. He said that in the coming year his highest priority will be Operation Breakthrough 2.0. He said that they will be looking to run 400 to 500 candidates. Energy Tax Revolt collected 939 signatures in one day and a total of 510 were required in the city of Bellflower. The city did try to stop the effort but we were able to prevail. Enough signatures were gathered in Culver City as well.

# 5. Credentials Report

Elizabeth Brierly gave a report. There were four people whose credentials were needed to be voted from the floor. Two from Region 47, Robert Underwood and Yvonne Underwood. Two from Region 42, Joe Furcinite and Jane Furcinite. The region did not submit their names.

2002 Convention Minutes: February 15-18, 2002

Add new section "c":

c. the adoption of alternative voting systems that more accurately reflect the will of the electorate, giving political minorities the chance to elect officials and thus affect public policy. We support proportional representation and Instant Runoff Voting (IRV).

Motion: Aaron Starr moved to strike the words "proportional representation and". Seconded.

Aaron said that he is in favor of Instant Runoff Voting but proportional representation gives political parties representation and he is opposed to institutionalizing political parties in state law. He said that political parties are a private institution.

Mr. Shoe spoke against the motion.

Ms. Grou spoke in favor. She said that proportional representation takes away purity. She said that wherever it is used squabbling occurs.

Mr. Teyssier spoke against. He said that there are several forms of proportional representation. He said that many other countries use it, that it is more accurate and more representative of the people and how they vote. He gave some examples.

Vote on the amendment: Failed on voice vote.

Bob Weber spoke against the main motion. He said that it should not be part of our Platform. He said that the Platform should deal with Libertarian principles of the proper sphere of government. He said when we get down to the absolute nuts and bolts of how to run the government we should keep it to an absolute minimum. He suggested that this belongs in the Program instead.

Several more people spoke on this item.

Vote on main motion: Failed 54-30 (lacked 2/3 and lacked majority of registered delegates).

Motion: Bob Weber moved to suspend the rules to consider a resolution. 2/3 approval to suspend rules.

Vote on motion to suspend the rules: 2/3 approval to suspend rules. Passed by voice vote.

Resolved that the Libertarian Party of California State Convention of 2002 supports the adoption of alternative voting systems that more accurately reflect the will of the electorate, giving political minorities the chance to elect officials and thus affect public policy. We especially support Instant Runoff Voting (IRV). Vote on motion : Passed by voice vote.

### Item 2 – Passed 14-0

Page 8, Plank 14. Family Life Create paragraphs as noted, and add new paragraph.

Government at all levels are intruding on the integrity of families and households. We support the right of families and households as contractual institutions to be free of government interference. Such government interference has undermined the value of families and households as cultural institutions of love, nurture, companionship, kinship and personal development by forcing families and households to conform to rigid, inflexible design.

As marriage should be a private contractual arrangement, so too should child support and custody. Violations of such arrangements, or court orders relating thereto, are civil violations and should not be treated as criminal violations or result in jail time.

Moreover...

Ms. Stewart spoke against the motion.

JR (nobody) Graham spoke against the motion.

Motion to amend: Mark Emerson moved to insert "except in cases of child abuse, molestation, and abandonment" before the word "violations" in second paragraph at the start of the second sentence.

As marriage should be a private contractual arrangement, so too should child support and custody. Except in cases of child abuse, molestation, and abandonment violations of such arrangements, or court orders relating thereto, are civil violations and should not be treated as criminal violations or result in jail time.

Motion to amend the amendment: Mark Selzer moved to add "neglect" to amendment.

As marriage should be a private contractual arrangement, so too should child support and custody. Except in cases of child abuse, molestation, neglect, and abandonment violations of such arrangements, or court orders relating thereto, are civil violations and should not be treated as criminal violations or result in jail time.

Vote on amendment to the amendment: Failed by voice vote.

Vote on amendment: Failed by voice vote.

### Libertarian Party of California Minutes, 2002 Annual Convention

As marriage should be a private contractual arrangement, so too should child support and custody. Violations of such arrangements, or court orders relating thereto, are civil violations and should not be treated as criminal violations or result in jail time.

Vote on main motion: Vote 57-29, Passed.

Vote result challenged by Aaron Starr, on basis that total number of delegates (as shown by overhead running totals) was now 118, so a majority was 60, not 57.

Acting Chair (Ted Brown) ruled that majority was still 57 based on most recent official Credentials Committee report. Ruling of Chair challenged by Aaron Starr.

Motion to suspend rules to revote based on new delegate totals. Passed by voice vote.

Motion to suspend rules to allow BJ Wagener to speak to the subject. Failed by voice vote.

On new vote, proposal failed 59-28 votes (lacked majority of registered delegates).

Chair announced that in the future, individuals credentialed as delegates may not vote until the next Credentials Committee report is made to update the number of delegates.

### Item 3 – Passed 11-0

Page 7, Plank 10, Health and Medicine Add at the end, a new "I":

I. The repeal of all laws mandating any non-consensual relationship between a health care provider and patient.

Motion to amend: change "non-consensual" to "non-voluntary"

I. The repeal of all laws mandating any non-voluntary relationship between a health care provider and patient.

Vote on amendment to the amendment: Failed by voice vote. Vote on amendment: Passed on voice vote. Vote on main proposal: Proposal passed on voice vote.

# Item 4 – Passed 11-0

Add new Plank 8 on Page 6, and renumber the subsequent ones.

8. Capital Punishment

While Libertarians disagree about the morality and deterrence value of capital punishment, it is well-documented that many innocent people have been falsely condemned to death. For this reason, we call for an end to the death penalty, and its replacement with life in prison without possibility of parole.

Motion: Bob Weber moved to table item until following Item 11. Failed on voice vote.

Motion to amend: Bob Weber moved to last sentence "except for government officials" after "end to the death penalty"

Vote on amendment: Fails by voice vote.

Vote on Item 4: Motion failed 66Yes, 34No. (lacked 2/3 of delegates)

### b) National Committee Representatives and Alternates

Joe Dehn, current National Committee Representative, stated that by the national formula, California is entitled to 1.9 representatives to the committee. He stated that the way we have deal with this is to act as if we are entitled to two, elect two and work with another state within our Region. Joe stated that he believed that Nevada was in agreement to work with us.

Combined California, Hawaii, Arizona grouping for 20.1% of national membership, entitling us to 2 delegates and two alternates.

Joe Dehn nominated for National Delegate. Elected on voice vote. **Results:** Mark Hinkle (1) and Scott Lieberman (2) nominated for National Alternatives. Elected unanimously by voice vote.

Amendment to amendment fails. Amendment is now "Funding will flow directly to government run schools and classrooms on a per pupil basis instead of school districts." **Amendment fails. Plank fails.**

# AMTRAK LIQUIDATION

*Whereas,* Amtrak is financially hemorrhaging in an amount to exceed \$44 billion in today's dollars over a 32-year period of time according to Cato Policy Analysis Report #425,02-08-02; and

*Whereas,* Amtrak Reform council has provided for the liquidation of this government owned, insolvent, fixed rail system; and

*Whereas,* in order to forestall the bankruptcy it has been suggested that Amtrak receive additional taxpayer dollars, \$12 billion and/or create a public-private partnership, a screen for corporate welfare, and

*Whereas,* among other lawsuits against Amtrak, a lawsuit for \$200 million is outstanding, filed by Bombardier, who was to build a train for Amtrak. Cited, and

*Whereas,* in the lawsuit according to a recent issue of Reason Magazine was Amtrak's bureaucracy's inability to make a decision over a 2-3 year period of time on which material to use for curtains for the train; *therefore, be it Resolved* by the Libertarian Party of California that this gross misuse of taxpayer dollars be ended; and be it further *Resolved,* The Libertarian Party of California demands full and complete liquidation of government-owned Amtrak assets, including all property owned by Amtrak. Pay the creditors from smallest claims first to the largest claims by a disassociated 3rd party. We demand that the United States government give over to the private sector, the fixed rail travel business entirely and forever.
