

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Politics **Historic Recall Election Recap**

uestion 1: Shall Gray Davis be recalled from the office of governor? ▶ Yes: 4,972,524 votes, or 55.4%

▶ No: 3.917.508 votes. or 44.6%

Question 2: Who shall replace Grav Davis?

Of course, Arnold Schwarzenegger won the historic 135-way race with, at last count, 48.6% of the vote. Opposing Lt. Governor Cruz Bustamante were an impressive 68.5% of voters (that's 6.14 million people!), including 13.5% who cast their vote for fiscal conservative Tom McClintock, a state senator and Republican.

As for the Libertarian Party, Ned Roscoe, the LPCendorsed candidate, ranked 34th of 135, with 2,248 votes, and Jack Hickey ranked 48th, with 1,689 votes.


Adding up the votes for all candidates identified on the ballot as "Libertarian," including Ken Hamidi (a self-described independent, who was listed as a Libertarian, and ranked 40th with 1,946 votes), the LP was chosen by 5,883 voters.

That's 5,883 people who refused to succumb to the "wasted vote" argument an argument most compelling in this particular election, Democrat Bustamante and his political philosophy being truly distasteful to so many.

We shall see over the term of Governor Schwarzenegger whether his reluctant supporters wasted their votes.

So, we've opted to focus on 2004, when there are many more elective offices we can target successfully. Quite a bit of planning will go into that effort. We're trying to figure out how we can do this without a full-time staff member at the office coordinating the effort, as we've had in previous years.

Electing candidates to office isn't the only way to increase the number of elected Libertarians. Sometimes we can get elected officials to switch parties.

We're very excited about Gray's prospects, especially when it comes to reaching out to his fellow elected officials. The big story of the year was, of course, the overwhelmingly successful recall of Governor Gray Davis. The Libertarian Party was the first political party to endorse the recall initiative, resulting in

We've been testing various methods of increasing our number of members, including doorto-door membership drives and telephone appeals. On another note, I want to thank everyone who telephoned and e-mailed to inquire about my welfare during the fire. Simi Valley, where I live, was hit pretty hard indeed, but we personally came through undamaged.

With each disaster I live through, or even witness from afar, the more convinced I become that Americans will come through for their neighbors in a time of need. Unfortunately, government uses our compassion against us by taxing us to help those in need.

Progress Against the Insane War on Drugs



n October 14, physicians and free speech advocates breathed a sigh of relief. That day the U.S. Supreme Court let stand a controversial appeals court ruling lifting the federal threat against doctors who recommend marijuana in California and all states which have ruled such speech legal.

The Justice Department had threatened to punish doctors for

simply speaking about marijuana. The high court's decision to reject an appeal of the U.S. Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals' ruling is a victory for the First Amendment free speech rights of doctors, and a sign that the libertarian fight for self-ownership is progressing.

The measure does not condone other uses of marijuana. Of course, we retain our bevy of laws prohibiting using your car to kill while smoking pot, operating a commercial jet while smoking pot, and probably prohibiting smoking pot while giving advice to one's patients.

"U.S. marijuana policy has lost all connection with facts and logic," said Marijuana Policy Project executive director Robert Kampia. But "the worldwide trend away from marijuana prohibition will eventually pull the U.S. toward more rational policies."

Along with the Supreme Court decision, I see signs supporting Kampia in his prediction.

Keith Stroup, Executive Director of NORML, said, "All the way up the chain...the courts have unequivocally stated that a physician's recommendation to his or her patient to engage in marijuana therapy is Constitutionally protected speech. This decision...frees physicians who

wish to discuss the use of medicinal cannabis with their patients from the heavy hand of government in-• Elizabeth Brierly

trusion.'

Progress was also evidenced on June 4, when Oakland's Edward Rosenthal, convicted in federal court of growing marijuana illegally, was sentenced to a token one day in prison, following jurors' arguments that had they known his purpose was medical, they would have acquitted. Rosenthal's sentence was about as lenient as the judge could have imposed, another sign of the tide turning against waging the War on Drugs.

Court Says IRS Can't Stop Taxpayer Recordings at Appeals Hearings

uly 8, 2003 brought a victory in the citizens' battle against tax bureaucrats. On that day, the Tax Court ruled (121 T.C. No. 2, Docket No. 11604-02L) that it is improper for the IRS Appeals division to disallow audio-recording of Appeals hearings, including Collections Due Process Hearings. The IRS had set a new "policy" prohibiting such recordings, despite the fact that under 26 USC ß 7521, the Appeals unit is required to allow such recordings.

IRS's illegal policy

The Tax Court invalidated the IRS's illegal policy, and ordered the IRS to start over in the case of the taxpayer who brought the suit. That taxpayer was Curtis Keene of Las Vegas, Nevada.

It is important to note that Keene refused to proceed with the meeting when the IRS personnel violated the law in refusing him

his right to create an audio record of the proceeding. The court stated that had Keene gone ahead with the meeting, even if he first objected, he would not have had standing to bring the suit.

This position by the Tax Court is consistent with appeals court decisions such as U.S. v. Johnson, 76 F. Supp. 538, which says, in effect, that you waive your rights if you don't assert them and

act accordingly.

The key passage in Johnson reads in part: "The [right] against self-incrimination is neither accorded to the passive resistant, nor the person who is ignorant of his rights, nor to one indifferent thereto. It is a fighting clause. Its benefits can be retained only by sustained combat.

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"It cannot be claimed by an attorney or solicitor. It is valid only when insisted upon by a belligerent claimant in person."

Taxation is Slavery: Listening to the wisdom of America's Founders

lavery was called "manstealing" before the Civil War because it reflected the theft of a person's self-ownership.

William Lloyd Garrison (1805-1879), one of the most famous Abolitionists, employed the selfownership concept to assault slavery before the Civil War.

Abolitionists needed a way to challenge the popular notion that owning another human was admissible. Slave-owners were using all sorts of abstractions to justify the enslavement of Blacks — everything from religion to socialist utopianism — mostly based on the idea that some people were incapable of running their own lives, and therefore must be controlled for their own benefit.

Borrowing from John Locke, Garrison argued that each and every individual owned himself or

herself, and therefore nobody could be a slave to another. This gave the Abolitionists the moral high ground with which to challenge involuntary servitude.

Unfortunately, this self-ownership concept was not employed against taxation at the time, simply because there were no federal taxes from Thomas Jefferson's presidency until the start of the Civil War.

And yet, like slavery, taxation is the worst form of stealing. It steals a person's life, time, and labor. Surely, if people own themselves, then they own what they produce.

And if they own what they legally produce, then nobody (even government) has a right to forcibly take it away. Whether it is called "protection money," extortion, or taxation, to collect money at the point of a qun is a form of slavery.

Abolitionism was one of the most important freedom movements in American history. It needs to be resurrected to fight this modern-day slavery.

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What to Do When You Can Afford Only One Poll

f you can only do *one* poll, when should it be conducted? When your campaign has the opportunity to conduct a poll, you want to get as much use out of the results as possible. For starters, having results before you announce may help you decide whether, in fact, you want to run. And if everything comes up roses, survey results may help you discourage another potential candidate from running and help you raise some money by demonstrating your potential to win. But don't bet a sizable portion of the campaign's cash on parlaying a survey into a fundraising windfall.

Even if you don't have a four-to-one favorable to unfavorable ratio with 90 percent name recognition, having results from a survey will help you structure your campaign.

A well-done survey can help you figure out what issues are really important to the voters, where you are relatively strong and weak — among different demographic groups and different attitudinal groups — and where your opponents are strong and weak. So you'll spend more time talking about the right things in the right places, and waste less time and money focusing on the wrong things.

Especially if you're a lesser-known challenger, don't get caught up in the horse race. An early survey is better at measuring longer-term attitudes than the final result. Ballot test questions at an early stage are helpful primarily for analyzing other results in the survey.

So the quick answer sounds like: "As soon as possible." But one of the fun

things — well, for consultants, anyway — is that there are no cut and dry answers, because the dynamics of each contest are a little different.

One compelling reason to hold off a bit is running in a contest with an unstable candidate field. This applies primarily if you've already decided to run, but are not sure who else is running. Imagine conducting a full-blown benchmark in July to figure out how to beat Fritz Hollings, only to find out in the beginning of August that he wouldn't be running.

Ideally, you'd wait until after the candidate qualifying deadline — or after the primaries set the field on the other side if you're without primary opposition. Local races with smaller dollar amounts that receive little attention until the closing weeks of the campaign are the most likely to afford the luxury of waiting until this point.

So the best answer is: "As soon as it is practical." Get your results back early enough to help you make good decisions, but not so early that the results are meaningless three months later.

Reefer Refugees: Provocative Sneak Preview of New Richard Cowan Book is Now On Line

egardless of how you feel about marijuana, Richard Cowan's Reefer Refugees is an explosive mixture of pot and politics.

The book documents the terrifying details of a drug war gone insane. If he doesn't get impeached or sent to jail, at the very least the news will dwell on this issue during most of his time in office. If it gets bad enough, the Democrats will "reluctantly" call for a recall.

Recall the recall?

By the way, no recall will occur for awhile. Rhetoric aside, the Democrats are quickly figuring out that their feigned concern about "recall after recall" neglects the sentiments of the voters. It would be political suicide for the Dems to call for a recall without criminal charges having been filed against Arnold.

But that is not possible outside Fantasyland. Unfortunately, no one except us Libertarians is willing to tell the people that a socialist Utopia is not an option.

Government monopolies

Then, to provide all these "services," politicians insist on using government monopolies and government employees, rather than competitively contracting out the services at huge savings. The legislators' obligation to the labor unions undermines most politicians, including many Republicans.

Compound this problem with the fact that California government employees (thanks largely to Davis and the legislature) are now the highest paid government employees in America — exceeding even the notoriously expen-

sive states of Hawaii and Alaska. With pensions that can come to 90% of salary, and disability options that allow most "public safety" employees to pension out early with non-job-related "injuries," this intractable problem cannot be overcome by our elected wusses. 70% or more of every government budget is payroll and perqs. If the politicos won't cut back here, the budget battle is lost. Someone has to tell the government employees to go pound sand. I don't see Arnold doing that.

Battle to end gridlock

Finally, watch the coming battle to end "gridlock" in the state legislature (disguised as "budget accountability"). If March, 2004 brings the passage of Proposition 56, the so-called "Budget Accountability Act" (dubbed by its opponents the "blank check initiative"), lowering to a 55% majority the 2/3majority legislative vote currently required for budget passage, the state will be doomed. The People's Republic of California will be a fait accompli.

It will be interesting to see what position Arnold takes on this crucial taxpayer protection. I'm hoping that he'll oppose the reduction, if only because he will not have undergone the August budget battle at that point.

Arnold has big muscles, but a weak stomach. He wants to be everyone's governor, which means he'll cave under pressure. Mark my words. Remember Pete Wilson and his \$14 billion tax increase? That will be the Schwarzenegger style.

Still, it will be fun to watch. And who knows what surprises might lurk in my scenario? I'm fairly sure I'm right — but then, I couldn't conceive of the Democrats losing a 3 to 1 race (counting Bill Simon) for governor. Politicians never cease to amaze me. It's show time!

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



It's for the Children: Using Emotional Arguments to Win the Case for Liberty

ften, we use good logical arguments to defend our freedoms. But such a strategy often fails. The reason is that our rights crumble and our freedoms perish most often on the power of emotions.

Let's look at some examples of how this happens, and then look at how to counter the encroachment.

Example 1. The police are conducting a Neighborhood Crime Watch meeting. A city councilperson is present. One of the 30 or so neighbors in attendance complains about "cars speeding by my house." She demands that speed bumps be installed.

She talks about the safety of the children, the implication being that anyone who opposes her is a monster who does not care about children's safety. Nobody wants to be seen as disregarding safety of children, so nobody opposes her.

Three months later, residents are damaging their cars daily as they drive over those speed bumps. Their cars, and the children who ride in them, are less safe because of repeated strain on the suspensions of those vehicles. Adding insult to injury, taxes go up to pay for this "service."

Disarming victims

Example 2. Barbara Boxer talks repeatedly about reducing crime. Her idea of reducing crime is to create more favorable conditions for violent criminals, by disarming their potential victims. Never mind that there is no logic in this Never mind that vice

logic in this. Never mind that violent crime is worse in every city and country that has adopted her

proposed "solution." She wins by appealing to emotions — "We need our streets and cities to be safe."

Exactly what Ms. Boxer finds so appealing about being defenseless against violent criminals — whether you are a pilot headed into lower Manhattan on a hijacked jet, or you are trapped in a Luby's cafeteria while your parents have been shot and your gun is in your car — she has yet to say.

And as long as she uses emotion to bludgeon others with her illogical and dangerous view, we'll never hear her reasonably justify her anti-freedom, anti-safety, anti-citizen views.

Example 3. Children who are unprotected by disarmed school faculty (for their own protection, allegedly) are killed by pipe bombs and other instruments of destruction. Subsequently, calls go out for further infringing the right to bear arms — and those calls get serious credence, because of "what happened to the children."

Never mind the facts of the situation. Never mind that two armed citizens safely aborted a similar situation. Emotions give power to those who think freedom is just another dirty word, and logic does not apply.

Example 4. Jobs evaporate in California. Legislators fail to see that oppressive legislation, punitive taxes, and bizarre rulings from the Ninth Circuit Court (the most overturned court in the nation) might have something to do with that. So they pass more regulations and raise taxes to make up for lost state revenue.

Never mind cause and effect. Emotional appeals to "do something" result in doing even more of what is not working and further exacerbating the problems.

An endless list

These are just four examples from an endless list. To the statist, the cure to any social ill is increased regulation (decreased freedom), followed by increased taxes (decreased wealth) to pay for it. These folks "cure" your problems by robbing you of your freedoms and your money — a classic case of the cure being worse than the disease. The tool these robbers use is emotion and they use emotion as skillfully in their robbery as a seasoned car thief uses a Slim-Jim in his.

At the heart of their philosophy are two premises. The first is that the same government that gave us the IRS and \$780 toilet seats is the cure for our problems. The second premise is that no other solution is on the horizon. Both premises are wrong. If you are concerned about freedom, take the time to attend public forums and show a different way. You must define the terms of the debate. Don't let the non-thinking statist do that for you!

In the first example, an astute lover of freedom might say something like the following. "I agree the safety of our children is important. That's why I don't want people driving on the sidewalk or my lawn to go around the speed bumps. That's why I don't want to see the cars that drive through here develop unsafe prematurely worn suspensions. I think you can agree that our children are too important for us to install something that anyone can see will lower the general safety.

"To reduce the speeding problem, why don't we form a volunteer committee to watch the neighborhood for one week? I know you will be the first to volunteer, as you have already stated the safety of our children is important. We can take down license numbers and Officer Friendly would be more than happy to contact those drivers for the safety of our children. Our mere presence will send the right message, so I know you will want to be out there."

You can see that you have changed the equation from:

safety of the children = more intrusion

to:

safety of the children = participating in solving the problem.

In one fell swoop, you have removed both premises. And you have wrested the Slim-Jim out of the hands of the statists by taking it into your own. When a statist uses emotional arguments, see those as the tools of robbery and pre-empt them for your own use.

Statists rob us of our freedoms by presenting false choices and making emotional appeals. You can use those same appeals to replace false choices with true choices. The freedom to make true choices is too important to surrender, don't you think?

So, the next time you see a Libertarian candidate at a sup-.

per club or a convention, thank him for carrying the torch for you. Better yet, volunteer to help her campaign or donate to it. All they get for their effort is our support and appreciation, so let's be sure to give it to them.

It would be futile

Let us say that you joined the Democrats to turn them around on the drug war and civil rights, or you joined the Republicans to make them really become the small government party. This would be futile because you will never get to the 60 or 70 percent mark it would take to turn those parties around. You will just be

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de-clawed and de-fanged and help to add your support, numbers, and votes to the people who are in control of those parties, who are raising taxes, and who are absconding with your civil rights. But as a Libertarian you can throw a big government politician out of office with only one or two percent of the vote.

The Republican and Democrat parties are like ships sinking in a quagmire of big government bureaucracy. By boarding their ship, vou just add your weight and help them sink *faster* — no matter your intentions when you decided to join. Your voice, even though it may speak the opposite of

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those in charge of that party, will just be used to shovel more coal on their locomotive's fire, helping them go faster down the track toward an ever bigger left- or right-wing big brother. Only outside those parties will you have the power to derail that train.

So let's keep our eyes on the prize. Let's understand that we are a minority opinion, and that we will not get that opinion heard by adding our voice to a chorus that disagrees with us — and which is part of the big government machine.
