Monterey Libertarians Join AntiWar Protest

onterey County Libertarians rallied for peace in a series of events organized over the weekend of March 17-19, 2007, the 4th anniversary of the US invasion of Iraq. A coalition of activists from across the political spectrum organized the events, including this author (former LPC Northern Vice Chair Lawrence K. Samuels), Prof. David R. Henderson, co-chair of Libertarians for Peace in Monterey County, and Hanan Shawar, coordinator of Monterey Code Pink.

Events began with a March 17 peace rally at Monterey's Window-on-the-Bay, where Libertarians for Peace set up an outreach table distributing flyers and buttons. Next to it was a children's shoe display; a tag on each shoe bore the name of a

child killed in Iraq since the US invasion. After the rally, some sixty demonstrators proceeded along Del Monte Blvd., waving peace symbols and antiwar

That night over fifty people attended an awards banquet honoring Congressman Sam Farr for his efforts to end the war in Iraq. In early 2007, Farr had introduced legislation to rescind Bush's authorization to use force, and to exempt libraries and booksellers from provisions of the USA Patriot Act.

Both Henderson and this author spoke to the audience about libertarian ideals and why we never should have invaded a foreign nation that had not threatened or attacked the United States. We mentioned that although libertarians have not always seen eye-to-eye with the liberal congressman, it was time to cement bridges and thank Farr for his peace work [see sidebar]. With humor, Farr replied that he never thought

■ hirty years ago a friend and I entered the 38th Street offices of New York's Free Libertarian Party (as it was then called). We were high school kids who'd only recently discovered the existence of third parties. We came to expand our political button collections, but we also left with some interesting literature. I've been following "this movement of ours" (as the late Samuel E. Konkin III liked to call it) ever since.

The French are right to say, "The more things change, the more they stay the same." I've been hearing the same complaints from libertarians for thirty years now: There aren't enough women in the party. Not enough minorities. We need more young people. We need greater access to the media. We must affect the culture. We need libertarians in Hollywood.

I understand the complaints. What amazes me is the selfrighteous indignation of many complainers. Each sounds as if he'd just discovered these problems. It's as if he's a lone voice of wisdom, bringing New Ideas to ignorant old-timers, when the reality is quite the opposite. The trouble is, rather

Dan Fernandes of Los Angeles County has founded a "Welcome, New American" project. If you had a good day collecting signatures, thank Ludwig von Mises. If that disturbs your equilibrium too much, thank Friedman. Only in America, the land of "non-fat decaf sugar-free white-chocolate coffee drinks," non-hierarchical grading, and values-neutral sex education could we imagine the notion of activism without ideas.

Human beings must be motivated by ideas. Action without ideas is mindless flailing. This is especially true for libertar-

ian activism. We are pushing a complicated set of ideas which are unfamiliar and at times threatening, even repulsive, to the people we are trying to influence.

going for its first decades, were educated and inspired about what they should do, and why they should do it, by these rarified intellectuals; libertarianism is nothing without books and ideas—and very specifically

without the books and ideas of Rand and Rothbard.

The more "book learning" a candidate or activist has, in both ideology and the practical application of the ideology, the better equipped he will be to communicate with voters. Of course, strategic intelligence about how to communicate with a given audience is essential. While my evidence is merely anecdotal, your campaign for water board is best served by

not making the latest debates on marginalism, Hoppian constitutional kingdoms, and the tragedy of the commons (well, what would you say, "Oh, it's a tragedy.") your three key issues.

This does not mean, however, that since your audience does not care about economic theory and philosophical principles that neither should you. On the contrary, it is all the more important that you do care, so that you can translate those ideas into simple, thoughtful explanations on the campaign trail

"Angela, could you suggest some sound bites or other examples of how to speak to voters?" How the heck would I know! Do I look like Michael Cloud? Coming next month: Conceptual Models of Labor Theory of Value as Applied to Individual Anarchism and Tips on Ties: What Your Choice in Men's Fashion Says About Your Campaign.

The Environmentalist Church of Gaia

Roman mythology and imperial cults have been replaced by a new state-supported religious mythology. The prime deity is none other than the Earth, or Mother Earth as adherents to the new religion call it. Adherents treat threats to their deity with ultimate seriousness. In the past it's been overpopulation, deforestation, man-made global cooling, and nuclear power. Today the prime threat to Mother Gaia is anthropogenic climate change.

As with any religion, environmentalists have a church through which their religious goals are effected. That church is the state, for no "sensible" country on this planet denies that anthropogenic climate change is occurring. Dissenters from the Kyoto Treaty are treated as churches in heresy; anomalies that must be reconverted to the faith.

Perhaps it seems absurd to call environmentalism a

subsidies. Waste management companies would voluntarily turn trash into profitable products—and recycling wouldn't be sacrificial. Instead, government subsidizes recycling programs, and Americans pay

for this government indulgence via higher taxes and wasted time spent sorting and recycling their own waste.

Environmentalists demand still further religious sacrifices. Carbon dioxide causes global warming, they claim, and thus we humans must drive less, use less oil, and use less energy in our daily business.

Like other religions,

Patrick Moore, the disaffected co-founder of Greenpeace, now calls environmentalist zealots "anti-human."

Whereas most religions seek the betterment of humanity, environmentalism is unique in that it seeks the opposite. The sacrifices that it demands will result in severe harm for those who most need help. In the developing world, environmentalists see an excellent place to implement their policies; existing infrastructure is hard to change, but poor countries provide a tabula rasa. Environmentalists preach solar and wind power, but these forms of energy are not reliable or powerful enough to industrialize a third world nation. If the developing world adopts the environmentalists' vision, billions of people who can benefit from industrialization will be condemned to remain in poverty.

Finally, like many religions, environmentalism preaches the end of the world. Fear mongering and predictions of apocalypse are their primary evangelizing

anthropogenic climate change won't cause the end of the world, no one will remember the hyperbolic claims made by environmental zealots. Instead, we'll be entertaining their latest apocalyptic fantasy.

Environmentalism constitutes a religion in every sense of the word, but that doesn't bother me. If progressives (who constitute most of the movement) find their lives empty of meaning absent a religion and thus decide to channel their energy into Earth worship, that's their business. But when they utilize the violently coercive powers of the state for their goals, reasonable people can justifiably challenge the basis of their beliefs.


Their assertion that carbon dioxide is causing unprecedented warming is false. The current warming is not unprecedented. During the Medieval Warming Period (AD 800-1300), temperatures were higher than today. Additionally, the assumption that carbon dioxide causes warming is false. Changes in global temperature precede changes in carbon dioxide levels by about 800 years. Carbon dioxide cannot be the cause if it follows its presumed effect. Finally, humans produce a tiny percentage of total carbon dioxide emissions. Volcanoes,

animal flatulence, and rotting vegetation all contribute heavily to carbon dioxide in the atmosphere. Humans account for about 4% of total carbon dioxide emissions, and carbon dioxide makes up about 0.38% of the atmosphere. Our effect on Earth's climate is extremely minimal. (See the British documentary, The Great Global Warming Swindle.)

Despite their erroneous environmentalists science, have been extremely successful in proselytizing their faith. They've convinced Americans to sacrifice at the altar of Mother Gaia, and they have turned the already ignoble state into an even uglier beast-their church, the effector of their religious goals. If allowed to continue, they'll destroy the American economy and doom billions of people in developing countries to perpetual poverty. Secularists are quick to call for a wall of separation between church and state. It is time that environmentalism be held to the same standard.

Recycling is subsidized by government in order to save money and energy by turning waste into usable products. But if recycling effected such economic savings, there'd be no need for

environmentalism is humancentered. Yes, in its purest form, it is Earth worship, its reverence directed at something non-human. But the tenets of the faith concern humans and their role in natural history. Humans are the problem, and the solution requires some bane to humanity. This is why tools. And like the apocalyptic predictions of other religions, those of environmentalism have never come to pass. But people have short memories, and fear is a powerful persuasive tool. 

Tap Into the Power of Endorsements

ndorsements are a powerful tool in gaining immediate credibility and support. Many people automatically vote for a candidate who is endorsed by a sitting elected official they already support. Endorsements from local members of Congress or city mayors can be especially potent, because voters have already selected them to win in prior elections. One "winner" can lead to another. Newspaper endorsements are also known to

Endorsements must be obtained or confirmed in writing. A direct letter from the endorser to the candidate is best. However, emails will suffice. Even an email from a trusted third party intermediary can suffice. But verbal "over the phone" endorsements should only be used when the candi-

date knows the endorser personally and there is no risk of reversal. Ask for the elected official's signa-



candidate "endorsement signature card" at the time of agree-

Elected Official Endorsements

Start *early*. Several weeks before filing. Earlier if possible. Make a list with all contact information of all local elected officials, including city council, county supervisor, state assembly and senate, and U.S. Congressional members. Local sewer, water, and vector boards do not typically carry much weight with voters.

Send a personal letter to the official with your campaign literature, so they may understand your positions on the issues, and ask them for their

endorsement with a pre-written letter that they merely have to sign. Include a self addressed & stamped return envelope. Make it easy for them to help you.

Call the office to confirm receipt of your letter. Talk directly to the endorser if possible. Elected state and US Congress officials have taxpayer-paid staff who cannot work on political election activities, so if you don't receive a reply, it may be due to the prohibition of administrative staff working on election matters.

Don't get angry if nobody responds to your requests. Get busy! Find a third party intermediary in the political party who can be your "qo-to" person to penetrate the organization and get your endorsement.

Remember, endorsers can endorse more than one candidate. Get support before your opponent decides to run. Ascertain if, and who, your potential endorsers have already endorsed. START EARLY!

The bottom line is simple. The more endorsements from sitting elected officials you obtain, the more votes you'll get.

Newspaper **Endorsements**

Make a list of all local newspapers that cover any part of your district. Cast a wide net in your search. There are many local "legal publication" newspapers that publish weekly and

are distributed free or for a nominal annual fee. With the dominance of large regional papers, these small weeklies are often the only local content papers available.

Regardless of size, every single newspaper endorsement is important, and adds credibility to the candidate.

Prominent Community Leader Endorsements

Don't ignore former school board and city council officials who might provide endorsements. Make a list of them. Any local PTA presidents or community activists that are widely known and respected should be included. Phone these folks to quickly create a list of several, or even dozens, who will en-

In making your list of former officials, focus your energies on those who likely still have high voter recognition.

Publish all your endorsements wherever space permits. Otherwise, cull them down to the most significant endorsements, for quick voter recognition. Congressional and state assembly endorsements are among the most influential.



Iraq and the Roots of War

arch 19 marked the fourth anniversary of the invasion of Iraq by U.S. forces. Across California and the United States, thousands of demonstrators mourned this event with peace rallies, funeral marches, and speeches. Like many concerned citizens, I organized and participated in several peace rallies in the Monterey area. These rallies represented a wide coalition of groups and ideas, ranging from labor activists, Democrats, Quakers, and United Nations associations to libertarians. But when I delved deeper into why my fellow peace activists were protesting, I discovered that they know little about the causes of war.

The war in Iraq is no different from most wars, except that it has striking similarities to the Napoleonic wars. Fought across continental Europe in the early 1800s, these series of wars were allegedly fought to liberate the people from their oppressors.



peatedly cited his intentions to replace kings and the nobility with liberty, equality, and

fraternity. There was only one problem. The people in adjacent foreign lands did not want to be liberated and referred to the invading Napoleon as the bogeyman. The only revolutionary idea that Napoleon gave to Europe was adding propaganda to the arsenal of war.

The Bush administration is chanting the same mantra in Iraq, arguing that American troops are there to secure a stable democracy. Like Napoleon's forces, American troops are involved in nation-building to "liberate" the Iraqis and provide them with the tools of democracy, even though Iraq has never had a democratic government in its 7,000-year history, or possessed any grassroots movements advancing the concept of liberty.

So what is the root cause of war? Some sociologists point to the authoritarian attitudes

of those who believe they are right, everyone else is wrong, and everyone must do as they command. This rigid mindset of one's own moral superiority permits ruling systems to engage in armed conflicts around the world and to commit all sorts of atrocities. Of course, any resulting collateral damage is considered acceptable because the war is being waged for a good cause.

Most wars are an affront to individual rights. When the few can command the many to do their murderous bidding, small conflicts tend to magnify into large ones. The concentration of power provides authorities with the collective means to execute their do-good pet policies. That is because most world leaders have succumbed to the Machiavellian notion that "the ends justify the means," contending that any violent act-murder, robbery, and so forth—is permissible providing that the end goal is a "greater good." And under this greatergood nostrum, the public often accepts the government's argument that war is peace, that

freedom is slavery, and that invading a foreign nation with a preemptive strike is a defense maneuver.

As Randolph Bourne wrote in 1918, "War is the health of the state." Government thrives off war and the hysteria it spawns. Without such conflicts, the authorities could not justify increased spying on citizens and suspension of citizens' rights.

The true culprit for war is a staunch belief in the infallibility of governmental power

Government needs war the way a heroin addict needs drugs. They need it to justify increasing taxes and expanding debt and to inflame nationalistic fervor. Governments need foreign devils and unstable conditions to prop up sagging popularity and economic policies. Even Thomas Paine recognized this truism in The Rights of Man, writing that "taxes were not raised to carry on wars, but that wars were raised to carry on taxes."

But the true culprit for war is a staunch belief in the infallibility of governmental power. To accept the legitimacy of the state is to embrace the necessity for war. For thousands of years, governments have been the guintessential war machine. If given the means, they tirelessly prepare for armed conflict with foreign and domestic opponents. They seek to protect their status, their authority, and their right to rule over others, creating an us versus them environment.

Conflict and war are the greatest threat to human liberty, life, and property. And a policy of perpetual war and nation-building eventually turns peaceful republics into violent empires.

The best road to peace is to allow citizens to structure their own lives as they see fit. When citizens are denied freedom, conflict flares and war is not far behind. Only a small, unobtrusive government can reduce intrasocietal and foreign conflict. Only an open society, in which citizens freely choose their own personal and economic lifestyles, can ensure a peaceful way of life.

closely, you might be surprised to see me standing here to say nice things about Sam Farr. It is true that

Sam and I have had our differences. He thinks price controls on new housing will make housing affordable; I, like most economists, think price controls on new housing will discourage construction, making housing less affordable.

But we've also had our agreements. Sam voted for NAFTA, which brought down barriers to imports from Iraq Resolution of 2002 (Public Law 107-243; 50 U.S.C. Mexico and Canada, making goods more affordable, and brought down Canadian and Mexican barriers to U.S. exports, benefiting our exporting industries. Sam also voted in 2005 for an important protection of property rights, namely, for permanent repeal of the death tax. Had this passed, it would have allowed people to keep what is rightfully theirs. Sam also has been a leader, along with my Republican congressman friend, Dana Rohrabacher, in the fight to get the federal government to stop interfering with people who want to use marijuana for medicinal

That's not all. Sam also has been a strong defender of civil liberties. He showed a lot of courage, not just in voting against the extension of the USA PATRIOT Act, but also in voting, shortly after September 11, against the original USA PATRIOT Act. He was one of only 66 members of the House of Representatives to do so. Not for him that mealy-mouthed line, "I voted against it before I voted for it." Sam was always against it, and bless you, Sam, for that.

Had that been all Sam had done, we wouldn't be here tonight. We are here because of two other things Sam has done, one in 2002 and one this year. In 2002, Sam

showed a healthy skepticism about George Bush's "I'm the President: trust me" approach to foreign policy. Sam voted against the blank check that Congress gave George Bush to make war on Iraqis.

And on January 11 this year, Sam did something even more important. He authored a bill, beautiful in its clarity and brevity, to remove George Bush's authority to make war in Iraq.

Let me read you a section of the bill:

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

SECTION 1. REPEAL OF PUBLIC LAW 107-243.

The Authorization for Use of Military Force Against 1541 note) is hereby repealed.

SEC. 2. WITHDRAWAL OF UNITED STATES ARMED FORCES FROM IRAO.

The President of the United States shall provide for the withdrawal of units and members of the United States Armed Forces deployed in Iraq as part of Operation Iraqi Freedom in a safe and orderly manner.

Guess what? I didn't read you a section of Sam's bill. I read you the whole bill. I've read parts of congressmen's bills before, but in my whole life I've read only a few bills all the way through and doing so took hours. How refreshing that Sam said so much with so little, in the best tradition of our Founding Fathers, whose First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution protected religious freedom, freedom of speech, freedom of the press, the right to peaceably assemble, and the right to petition with only 45 words. Sam's bill is a better bill than any of the other bills on the war that Congress is considering.

The cause of peace is the most important issue facing our nation today. We have far too many people, in Congress and out, who are willing to trust a powerful president. For your leadership on this issue, I say, "Thank you, Sam."

GPS Eases Signature Gathering

signature gathering to get onto the ballot is a tedious and labor intensive affair, one that dissuades many candidates from even running. Fortunately, the burden of signature gathering is lessened with DeLorme mapping software.

I first used DeLorme in my 2004 race for an assembly seat in Huntington Beach (Assembly District 67). The candidate first creates a spreadsheet with the addresses of all registered Libertarians within his or her chosen district. This spread-



sheet data is then entered into DeLorme. DeLorme will create a geographic map that highlights all registered

Libertarians in that district (see green flags in fig. 1). This map makes it easier both to locate your signature prospects and plan the shortest route to hitting them all.

But wait, DeLorme offers still more advantages!

I did much of my signature gathering after work. Often after sundown. If you've ever searched for a residential street address, in an unfamiliar neighborhood, after dark, well, you know how difficult that can be.

House address numbers aren't always conveniently located, much less illuminated, so that they can be seen from a passing car. It is both frustrating and time-consuming to search for those worn-off street numbers painted on sidewalks, in the dark of night.

But DeLorme has the solution! DeLorme can be hooked up to a GPS receiver. With my trusty GPS, I didn't *need* to see the house numbers. My GPS told me exactly when I was in front of the right house (see fig. 2).

With DeLorme, I gathered 135 signatures, all by my lonesome. All those signatures were obtained through direct personal contact. For many registered Libertarians, I was their first contact with someone from the Party—and they were delighted that I came by! I'd initiated direct, personal relationships with actively-voting Libertarians who crave to help in non-monetary ways. I recruited four new candidates for City Council during my signature gathering. And I culled the rolls of non-locatable members. One third of my initial

list of registered Libertarians turned out to be inaccurate.

With what I learned throughout my signature gathering, I kept updating the map and database in my DeLorme. I drew city,

school, and Assembly boundaries. On the map, I marked the best locations for signs. I marked locations where I had permission for signs, where permission was expressly denied, where I had placed signs, and whether it was a large or a small sign. This data is reusable for all future elections. And I can pass this data on to other candidates.

My one-time costs were \$100 for the DeLorme software, and \$100 for the GPS receiver. However, DeLorme will give us a discount on multiple packages. They can even customize the software for our specific requirements. I recommend each county LP obtain a copy of this software, or something like it.
